





ABOUT YOUR CITY GOVERNMENT

The City of Ludington employs a city manager as a professional administrator to oversee the operations, services, and personnel of the City as directed by the goals and ordinances set forth by the Ludington City Council.

In 2015 the Ludington City Council will meet in regular session on the second and fourth Mondays of each month with the exception of the months of May and December. 
Central Bark @ Cartier Park

HOMEOWNER'S PRINCIPAL RESIDENCE EXEMPTION: Homestead exemption forms must be filed before June 1 in order to receive the exemption for that year.

CONDITIONAL RESCISSION OF A PRINCIPAL RESIDENCE EXEMPTION (PRE): This form enables a person who has established a new principal residence to retain a PRE on property previously exempt as the owner's principal residence. The conditional rescission allows an owner to receive a PRE on his or her current Michigan property and on previously exempted property simultaneously if certain criteria are met. An owner may receive the PRE on the previous principal residence for up to three years if that property is not occupied, is for sale, is not leased, and is not used for any business or commercial purpose.

DISABLED VETERAN'S EXEMPTION: Governor Snyder has signed into law P.A. 161 of 2013 exempting disabled veterans or un-remarried surviving spouses from property taxes of their principal homestead. Affidavits are available at the Assessor's office and must be filed each year before December 31.

POVERTY EXEMPTION: The City's poverty exemption policy and application are available at the Assessor's office. Applications may be filed with the March, July or December Board of Review.

PROPERTY ASSESSMENTS: Notices of Assessment, Taxable Valuation (including Leasehold Improvements) and Property Classification will be mailed out the third week of February. Appeals are filed with the March Board of Review. This is done by appointment or by letter. Assessment notices will have the dates and times for the Board of Review.

PROPOSAL A

UNDERSTANDING YOUR PROPERTY ASSESSMENT: Proposal A was approved as a constitutional amendment by Michigan voters in 1994. It was designed to limit the growth of property taxes by the Consumer Price Index until ownership of the property was transferred. Prior to Proposal A, property taxes were based on the State Equalized Values (SEV). Since the passage of Proposal A, taxes are based on Taxable Value (T.V.) Each year, the Assessing Office must calculate the S.E.V. for every property based upon the time frame required by the State Tax Commission (STC). A property's taxable status is determined as of December 31 of each year, known as tax day. In addition, the assessor must calculate the taxable value for every property based on the changes to the CPI, plus any additions or losses to the property. The taxable value cannot increase more than 5% in any year. For 2015, the CPI has been calculated to be 1.6%

SALE PRICE IS NOT THE TRUE CASH VALUE: The law defines True Cash value as the usual selling price of a property. The Legislature and the Courts have very clearly stated that the actual selling price of a property is not a controlling factor in the True cash value or the SEV as calculated by the assessor. For this reason, when analyzing sales for the purpose of determining assessment changes, the Assessing Office will review all sales but exclude non-representative sales from the analysis. "Following sales" is described as the practice of assessing properties which HAVE RECENTLY SOLD differently from properties which HAVE NOT RECENTLY SOLD. This is unconstitutional and illegal. It is important to note that a property does not uncup to the selling price but to the SEV in the year following a sale.

FORECLOSURE SALES: Part of the definition of usual selling price is the qualifier that the sale does not involve any element of distress from either party. The STC has issued guidelines concerning foreclosure sales and generally speaking, these guidelines prevent the assessor from considering foreclosure sales when calculating values for assessment purposes. For this reason, all distressed sales, such as mortgage foreclosures or sales involving transfers to or from related parties are not considered as typical sales in the valuation of property for assessment purposes nor are they reliable indicators of value when making market comparisons for the current or assessed values or appeals.

IMPORTANT TERMS ON YOUR NOTICE TAXABLE VALUE: The value used to calculate the tax on your property. Due to proposal A, a property's taxable value can only increase annually by the rate of inflation or 5%, whichever is less, unless there is an addition to the property or the property transferred ownership during the previous tax year.

State Equalized Value: One half of the property's TCV

ASSESSED VALUE: Generally the same as the SEV, unless an equalization factor other than 50% has been applied by the State or the county in which the property is located.

Remember, it is possible for two identical homes to have drastically different taxable values and taxes. Proposal A capped taxes on homes that are not sold, added the principal residence exemption, but does not necessarily mean similar values homes pay the same amount in taxes.

WATER AND WASTEWATER TREATMENT PLANTS

The Ludington Wastewater Treatment Plant, (circa 1975) located at 5160 W. Sixth Street, has 31 acres of aerated lagoons, which hold 90 million gallons for biological treatment. After the water leaves the lagoons, it is treated for phosphorus and solids removal, chlorinated for disinfection, and discharged to the Pere Marquette River. Another service that the City offers at the plant is an RV dump station, which is open to the public free of charge. The area served by the wastewater plant includes the City of Ludington, Pere Marquette Charter Township, Amber Township, City of Scottville, West Shore Community College, and Tamarac Village. In total, the plant treats approximately 2.5 million gallons of wastewater each day.

The Ludington Water Treatment Plant, (circa 1969) located at 501 N. Lakeshore Drive, treats and pumps water to the distribution system for drinking water and fire protection purposes. The water treatment plant also serves the City of Scottville and portions of Pere Marquette and Amber Townships. The Ludington Water Treatment Plant is operated and staffed around the clock, 365 days per year by state licensed operators.

THINK BEFORE YOU FLUSH IT

Have you ever asked yourself 'Where does the water in my house go after I use it?' If you haven't, perhaps you should. The wastewater, and everything else that it transports, ultimately ends up at the wastewater treatment plant. However, some people don't give it a second thought. Every day, the staff that maintains the collection system finds things that don't belong there.

Here is just a sampling of things found in the collection system.

- Rags
- Cooking Grease
- Prescription Medications
- Disposable Gloves
- Feminine Hygiene Products
- Toys
- Pop Cans/ Bottles

These items, and many more, cause major problems with the pipes, pumps, and aeration equipment in the wastewater treatment process. Just because a manufacturer claims a product to be 'flushable' doesn't mean that it belongs in the sewer. (Money is 'flushable', but you wouldn't do that on purpose, would you?) All of the foreign objects found in the sewer ultimately cost the user due to increased maintenance costs. So the next time that you don't know what to do with something, **think before you flush it!**

LUDINGTON POLICE DEPARTMENT

The Ludington Police Department is a full service police department serving approximately 8,100 permanent year-round residents, and offering 24/7 patrol coverage for the three and a half square miles of the City of Ludington.

The mission that we are committed to is “enhancing the quality of life, promoting peace and identifying and resolving neighborhood problems within the City of Ludington by exercising an ongoing working partnership with the community; to be accomplished through the empowerment of both police officers and citizens.”

By adhering to the philosophy of Community Policing, the men and women of the Ludington Police Department enjoy strong support by city residents. This partnership is most apparent by the level of two-way communication that occurs.

While Ludington enjoys abundant natural resources, the resource that is most significant are the people that live, work and recreate here! It is the goal of the Ludington Police Department to continue to serve the community in which we live.

School Resources: The Ludington School Resource Officer works collaboratively with administration and staff members at Ludington High School, O.J. DeJonge Middle School and four elementary schools located within the City, as well as Journey Alternative School. The Resource Officer handles police calls at all the school campuses and offers law enforcement education to students of all grade levels. The SRO serves as an important link between the school, the police department and student’s homes.

Computer Forensic: Located at the Ludington Police Department, the Digital Forensics Lab provides investigators with the ability to collect, preserve and analyze digital evidence residing on various digital storage devices for use in the investigation and prosecution of criminal cases.

The Digital Forensics Lab is a collaboration between the Ludington Police Department and the Mason County Sheriff’s Office. The construction and equipping of the Lab was made possible with funds donated by local businesses and individuals, as well as Homeland Security funds.

The Lab is staffed by Det. Mike Kenney (M.C.S.O.), R/Ofc. Stephen Marx (L.P.D.), Ofc. Jacob Miller and Dep. Matt Warmuskerken (M.C.S.O.). Through their efforts Mason County area investigators are provided with this needed service in a timely manner.

Marine Patrol, Fire Suppression and Search, Rescue & Recovery: Partnering together the Ludington Fire Department and the Ludington Police Department operate HARBOR ONE conducting marine patrols, fire suppression and search, rescue and recovery operations in and around the Ludington Harbor. HARBOR ONE is a 26’ Harbor Guard boat equipped with a fire monitor and eight foot dive doors on both sides allowing for the easy recovery of swimmers, drowning victims and divers.

Three L.P.D. officers are trained, equipped and work with the Mason County Sheriff’s Office-Dive Team. The Dive Team utilizes vessels from both departments as well as recently purchased Side Scan Sonar equipment for underwater search and recovery operations.

We are a member of the Western Mason County Fire District, which is comprised of Pere Marquette Township Fire Department and Hamlin Township Fire Department to whom we receive and supply mutual aid, as well as the rest of Mason County when called upon.

The City of Ludington Fire Department responds to fires, medical emergencies, vehicle accidents and extrications, hazardous materials spills and leaks, water rescues, and many other types of emergency calls.

The Ludington Fire Department is involved throughout the community in many ways. Whether teaching children about Fire Safety, or being an active part of community events and festivals, the Ludington Fire Department plays an active role in our community.

The Building Department provides plan review, permit issuance and inspections on all construction and site work within the City Limits. It enforces building and construction codes and enforces the City property maintenance code and handles complaints regarding the code.

GRASS AND WEEDS: It is the responsibility of the occupant and/or the owner of unoccupied premises within the City to cut and remove or destroy by lawful means, all such weeds, grass, or rank, noxious or harmful vegetation as often as may be necessary to comply with section 18-32 of the Ludington City Code. All premises and exterior property shall be maintained free from weeds or plant growth in excess of 10 inches (254 mm). All noxious weeds shall be prohibited. Weeds shall be defined as all grasses, annual plants and vegetation, other than trees or shrubs provided; however, this term shall not include cultivated flowers and gardens. **FAILURE TO ABIDE BY THIS RULING COULD RESULT IN THE CITY OF LUDINGTON CUTTING THE GRASS AND BILLING THE OWNER FOR THE WORK.**

EXTERIOR PROPERTY/JUNK: No person shall place or store any junk, garbage, inoperable recreational vehicle or demolition derby car on the exterior portion of any property in the City of Ludington or on any street right of way or any city property. An owner or occupant shall keep the exterior property in a clean, safe and sanitary condition.

STREET NUMBERS: Addresses must be displayed in a position easily observed and readable from the public right of way. All numbers shall be in Arabic numbers at least 3 inches (76 mm) high and 1/2 inch (13 mm) wide.

SMOKE DETECTORS: Every landlord shall install a UL-approved smoke detector in accordance with the manufacturer's instruction on the ceiling or within six inches of the ceiling in each of the following locations in a rental unit: In each bedroom or sleeping area, in the immediate vicinity of the main heating unit and the water heater. If either the heating unit or water heater is or if both of these are located in the basement, the smoke detector shall be installed in the stairwell leading to the basement. In each common hallway between dwelling units in any structure containing more than one dwelling unit. As otherwise required by an applicable state or local building code in effect in the City.

GARAGE SALES: No more than a total of three (3) garage sales, yard sales or similar sales per lot in any calendar year are permitted and not more than a total of three (3) of such sales in combination in any calendar year. No single sale shall continue for more than two days. All materials from such sales shall be removed from the exterior of the premises within twenty-four (24) hours after the completion of such sale. Yard sale signs are permitted on the private property ONLY. Yard sale signs are not permitted in the City right of way, attached to trees, telephone poles, street lights, public benches, etc.

CURFEWS FOR MINORS: No minor under the age of 14 years shall loiter, idle, wander, alleys, parks, public buildings, etc., between the hours of 10:00 p.m., and 6:00 a.m. of the following day. No minor between the age of 14 years and under the age of 17 years shall loiter, idle, wander, stroll or play in or upon the public streets, highways, roads, alleys, parks, public buildings, places of amusement and entertainment, vacant lots or other unsupervised places between the hours of 12:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m.

OPEN BURNING: Allowable burning: Open burning shall be allowed without prior notification to the code official for recreational fires, highway safety flares, smudge pots and similar occupational needs. In the event that any recreational fire shall become a nuisance by reason of smoke or flying embers, or if it shall pose any danger to persons or property, the fire chief or his designee or any police officer of the City of Ludington, may order such fire extinguished, and in the event that the owner, occupant or person responsible for such fire shall fail to extinguish such fire, such failure shall constitute a municipal civil infraction. Notice that a fire is a nuisance or poses a danger may be verbal and need not be in writing, nor shall other notice requirements provided in the fire prevention code be applicable to such circumstance. The fire chief or his designee or any police officer of the City is further authorized to extinguish any recreational fire that is a nuisance.

PARKING: No vehicle shall be parked in the customarily traveled portion of any street within the city between the hours of 3:00 a.m. and 7:00 a.m. during the months of November, December, January, February, March and April.

DOGS: No person shall own, harbor or keep any dog which, by loud or frequent or habitual barking, yelping or howling, shall cause annoyance to the people in the neighborhood.
TO REPORT BARKING DOGS CALL: (231) 843-8644 OR CENTRAL DISPATCH: 911

SNOW REMOVAL: Removal of snow from sidewalks and drives is responsibility of the property owner/occupant. Snow cannot be shoveled or moved to the street or to other's private property.

SIDEWALKS: By ordinance, sidewalk maintenance and repair is the responsibility of the property owner. To assist owners in replacing sidewalk, the City of Ludington offers a 50% cost-sharing program. For questions or to sign-up for the program, contact the Department of Public Works at (231) 843-2873. **REPAIR PRIOR TO SALE:** No person shall sell any property in the City of Ludington that has any damaged or dangerous sidewalks without repairing or replacing such sidewalk prior to sale. All repairs or replacements shall be in accordance with city specifications.

ALLEY PAVING: Alley paving is done by a special assessment to the property owners. For more information please contact the City Clerk at (231) 845-6237.

CHRISTMAS TREES: The City of Ludington will pick up your Christmas tree at curb side through the end of January. After that time, Republic Service will pick up your Christmas tree with your regular garbage.

CURB CUTS: No opening in or through any curb or any street shall be made without first obtaining a written permit from the Department of Public Works. Curb cuts and sidewalk driveway crossings to provide access to private property shall comply City specifications. Permits can be obtained from City Hall or call (231) 843-2873 for information.

BASIC RESIDENTIAL COLLECTION SERVICE: Basic service will consist of one collection each week of up to ninety-nine gallons of household refuse. Containers of any size can be used, however all refuse must be bagged using three 33-gallon bags, or eight 13-gallon bags. Additional bags will require an additional refuse sticker at \$2.00 each.

ADDITIONAL SERVICES/FEES: Please contact Public Works at (231) 843-2873 for information on the following services and fees: Additional Mixed Refuse Bag Stickers, Bulky Item Stickers (Furniture large items, etc., Building material not to exceed one bushel in volume, 30lbs. in weight & no longer than 4 ft. in length), Appliance Stickers (without Freon), Appliance Stickers (with Freon), (Refrigerator, Air Conditioners, Dehumidifiers, etc.), Yard Waste Bags, Yard Waste Cart (90 gallon), 90 Gallon Refuse Container, and 4 yard Dumpster.


