### Central Bark @ Cartier Park



**HOMEOWNER'S PRINCIPAL RESIDENCE EXEMPTION:** Homestead exemption forms must be filed before June 1 in order to receive the exemption for that year.

**CONDITIONAL RESCISSION OF A PRINCIPAL RESIDENCE EXEMPTION (PRE):** This form enables a person who has established a new principal residence to retain a PRE on property previously exempt as the owner's principal residence. The conditional rescission allows an owner to receive a PRE on his or her current Michigan property and on previously exempted property simultaneously if certain criteria are met. An owner may receive the PRE on the previous principal residence for up to three years if that property is not occupied, is for sale, is not leased, and is not used for any business or commercial purpose.

**DISABLED VETERAN'S EXEMPTION:** Governor Snyder has signed into law P.A. 161 of 2013 exempting disabled veterans or un-remarried surviving spouses from property taxes of their principal homestead. Affidavits are available at the Assessor's office and must be filed each year before December 31.

**POVERTY EXEMPTION:** The City's poverty exemption policy and application are available at the Assessor's office. Applications may be filed with the March, July or December Board of Review.

**PROPERTY ASSESSMENTS:** Notices of Assessment, Taxable Valuation (including Leasehold Improvements) and Property Classification will be mailed out the third week of February. Appeals are filed with the March Board of Review. This is done by appointment or by letter. Assessment notices will have the dates and times for the Board of Review.

# PROPOSAL A

**UNDERSTANDING YOUR PROPERTY ASSESSMENT:** Proposal A was approved as a constitutional amendment by Michigan voters in 1994. It was designed to limit the growth of property taxes by the Consumer Price Index until ownership of the property was transferred. Prior to Proposal A, property taxes were based on the State Equalized Values (SEV). Since the passage of Proposal A, taxes are based on Taxable Value (T.V.) Each year, the Assessing Office must calculate the S.E.V. for every property based upon the time frame required by the State Tax Commission (STC). A property's taxable status is determined as of December 31 of each year, known as tax day. In addition, the assessor must calculate the taxable value for every property based on the changes to the CPI, plus any additions or losses to the property. The taxable value cannot increase more than 5% in any year.

**SALE PRICE IS NOT THE TRUE CASH VALUE:** The law defines True Cash value as the usual selling price of a property. The Legislature and the Courts have very clearly stated that the actual selling price of a property is not a controlling factor in the True cash value or the SEV as calculated by the assessor. For this reason, when analyzing sales for the purpose of determining assessment changes, the Assessing Office will review all sales but exclude non-representative sales from the analysis. "Following sales" is described as the practice of assessing properties which HAVE RECENTLY SOLD differently from properties which HAVE NOT RECENTLY SOLD. This is unconstitutional and illegal. It is important to note that a property does not uncap to the selling price but to the SEV in the year following a sale.

**FORECLOSURE SALES:** Part of the definition of usual selling price is the qualifier that the sale does not involve any element of distress from either party. The STC has issued guidelines concerning foreclosure sales and generally speaking, these guidelines prevent the assessor from considering foreclosure sales when calculating values for assessment purposes. For this reason, all distressed sales, such as mortgage foreclosures or sales involving transfers to or from related parties are not considered as typical sales in the valuation of property for assessment purposes nor are they reliable indicators of value when making market comparisons for the current or assessed values or appeals.

**IMPORTANT TERMS ON YOUR NOTICE TAXABLE VALUE:** The value used to calculate the tax on your property. Due to proposal A, a property's taxable value can only increase annually by the rate of inflation or 5%, whichever is less, unless there is an addition to the property or the property transferred ownership during the previous tax year.

State Equalized Value: One half of the property's TCV

**ASSESSED VALUE:** Generally the same as the SEV, unless an equalization factor other than 50% has been applied by the State or the county in which the property is located.

*Remember, it is possible for two identical homes to have drastically different taxable values and taxes. Proposal A capped taxes on homes that are not sold, added the principal residence exemption, but does not necessarily mean similar values homes pay the same amount in taxes.*

# WATER AND WASTEWATER TREATMENT PLANTS

**The Ludington Wastewater Treatment Plant**, (circa 1975) located at 5160 W. Sixth Street, has 31 acres of aerated lagoons, which hold 90 million gallons for biological treatment. After the water leaves the lagoons, it is treated for phosphorus and solids removal, chlorinated for disinfection, and discharged to the Pere Marquette River. Another service that the City offers at the plant is an RV dump station, which is open to the public free of charge. The area served by the wastewater plant includes the City of Ludington, Pere Marquette Charter Township, Amber Township, City of Scottville, West Shore Community College, and Tamarac Village. In total, the plant treats approximately 2.5 million gallons of wastewater each day.

**The Ludington Water Treatment Plant**, (circa 1969) located at 501 N. Lakeshore Drive, treats and pumps water to the distribution system for drinking water and fire protection purposes. The water treatment plant also serves the City of Scottville and portions of Pere Marquette and Amber Townships. The Ludington Water Treatment Plant is operated and staffed around the clock, 365 days per year by state licensed operators.

## THINK BEFORE YOU FLUSH IT

Have you ever asked yourself 'Where does the water in my house go after I use it?' If you haven't, perhaps you should. The wastewater, and everything else that it transports, ultimately ends up at the wastewater treatment plant. However, some people don't give it a second thought. Every day, the staff that maintains the collection system finds things that don't belong there.

Here is just a sampling of things found in the collection system.

- Rags
- Feminine Hygiene Products
- Cooking Grease
- Toys
- Prescription Medications
- Pop Cans/ Bottles
- Disposable Gloves

These items, and many more, cause major problems with the pipes, pumps, and aeration equipment in the wastewater treatment process. Just because a manufacturer claims a product to be 'flushable' doesn't mean that it belongs in the sewer. (Money is 'flushable', but you wouldn't do that on purpose, would you?) All of the foreign objects found in the sewer ultimately cost the user due to increased maintenance costs. So the next time that you don't know what to do with something, **think before you flush it!**

# LUDINGTON POLICE DEPARTMENT

The Ludington Police Department is a full service police department serving approximately 8,100 permanent year-round residents, and offering 24/7 patrol coverage for the three and a half square miles of the City of Ludington.

The mission that we are committed to is “enhancing the quality of life, promoting peace and identifying and resolving neighborhood problems within the City of Ludington by exercising an ongoing working partnership with the community; to be accomplished through the empowerment of both police officers and citizens.”

By adhering to the philosophy of Community Policing, the men and women of the Ludington Police Department enjoy strong support by city residents. This partnership is most apparent by the level of two-way communication that occurs.

While Ludington enjoys abundant natural resources, the resource that is most significant are the people that live, work and recreate here! It is the goal of the Ludington Police Department to continue to serve the community in which we live.

**School Resources:** The Ludington School Resource Officer works collaboratively with administration and staff members at Ludington High School, O.J. DeJonge Middle School and four elementary schools located within the City, as well as Journey Alternative School. The Resource Officer handles police calls at all the school campuses and offers law enforcement education to students of all grade levels. The SRO serves as an important link between the school, the police department and student’s homes.

**Computer Forensic:** Located at the Ludington Police Department, the Digital Forensics Lab provides investigators with the ability to collect, preserve and analyze digital evidence residing on various digital storage devices for use in the investigation and prosecution of criminal cases.

The Digital Forensics Lab is a collaboration between the Ludington Police Department and the Mason County Sheriff’s Office. The construction and equipping of the Lab was made possible with funds donated by local businesses and individuals, as well as Homeland Security funds.

The Lab is staffed by Det. Mike Kenney (M.C.S.O.), R/Ofc. Stephen Marx (L.P.D.), Ofc. Jacob Miller and Dep. Matt Warmuskerken (M.C.S.O.). Through their efforts Mason County area investigators are provided with this needed service in a timely manner.

**Marine Patrol, Fire Suppression and Search, Rescue & Recovery:** Partnering together the Ludington Fire Department and the Ludington Police Department operate HARBOR ONE conducting marine patrols, fire suppression and search, rescue and recovery operations in and around the Ludington Harbor. HARBOR ONE is a 26’ Harbor Guard boat equipped with a fire monitor and eight foot dive doors on both sides allowing for the easy recovery of swimmers, drowning victims and divers.

Three L.P.D. officers are trained, equipped and work with the Mason County Sheriff’s Office-Dive Team. The Dive Team utilizes vessels from both departments as well as recently purchased Side Scan Sonar equipment for underwater search and recovery operations.

The Building Department provides plan review, permit issuance and inspections on all construction and site work within the City Limits. It enforces building and construction codes and enforces the City property maintenance code and handles complaints regarding the code.

**GRASS AND WEEDS:** It is the responsibility of the occupant and/or the owner of unoccupied premises within the City to cut and remove or destroy by lawful means, all such weeds, grass, or rank, noxious or harmful vegetation as often as may be necessary to comply with section 18-32 of the Ludington City Code. All premises and exterior property shall be maintained free from weeds or plant growth in excess of 10 inches (254 mm). All noxious weeds shall be prohibited. Weeds shall be defined as all grasses, annual plants and vegetation, other than trees or shrubs provided; however, this term shall not include cultivated flowers and gardens. **FAILURE TO ABIDE BY THIS RULING COULD RESULT IN THE CITY OF LUDINGTON CUTTING THE GRASS AND BILLING THE OWNER FOR THE WORK.**

**EXTERIOR PROPERTY/JUNK:** No person shall place or store any junk, garbage, inoperable recreational vehicle or demolition derby car on the exterior portion of any property in the City of Ludington or on any street right of way or any city property. An owner or occupant shall keep the exterior property in a clean, safe and sanitary condition.

**STREET NUMBERS:** Addresses must be displayed in a position easily observed and readable from the public right of way. All numbers shall be in Arabic numbers at least 3 inches (76 mm) high and 1/2 inch (13 mm) wide.

**SMOKE DETECTORS:** Every landlord shall install a UL-approved smoke detector in accordance with the manufacturer's instruction on the ceiling or within six inches of the ceiling in each of the following locations in a rental unit:

In each bedroom or sleeping area, in the immediate vicinity of the main heating unit and the water heater. If either the heating unit or water heater is or if both of these are located in the basement, the smoke detector shall be installed in the stairwell leading to the basement. In each common hallway between dwelling units in any structure containing more than one dwelling unit. As otherwise required by an applicable state or local building code in effect in the City.

**GARAGE SALES:** No more than a total of three (3) garage sales, yard sales or similar sales per lot in any calendar year are permitted and not more than a total of three (3) of such sales in combination in any calendar year. No single sale shall continue for more than two days. All materials from such sales shall be removed from the exterior of the premises within twenty-four (24) hours after the completion of such sale. Yard sale signs are permitted on the private property ONLY. Yard sale signs are not permitted in the City right of way, attached to trees, telephone poles, street lights, public benches, etc.

**CURFEWS FOR MINORS:** No minor under the age of 14 years shall loiter, idle, wander, alleys, parks, public buildings, etc., between the hours of 10:00 p.m., and 6:00 a.m. of the following day. No minor between the age of 14 years and under the age of 17 years shall loiter, idle, wander, stroll or play in or upon the public streets, highways, roads, alleys, parks, public buildings, places of amusement and entertainment, vacant lots or other unsupervised places between the hours of 12:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m.

**OPEN BURNING:** Allowable burning: Open burning shall be allowed without prior notification to the code official for recreational fires, highway safety flares, smudge pots and similar occupational needs. In the event that any recreational fire shall become a nuisance by reason of smoke or flying embers, or if it shall pose any danger to persons or property, the fire chief or his designee or any police officer of the City of Ludington, may order such fire extinguished, and in the event that the owner, occupant or person responsible for such fire shall fail to extinguish such fire, such failure shall constitute a municipal civil infraction. Notice that a fire is a nuisance or poses a danger may be verbal and need not be in writing, nor shall other notice requirements provided in the fire prevention code be applicable to such circumstance. The fire chief or his designee or any police officer of the City is further authorized to extinguish any recreational fire that is a nuisance.

**PARKING:** No vehicle shall be parked in the customarily traveled portion of any street within the city between the hours of 3:00 a.m. and 7:00 a.m. during the months of November, December, January, February, March and April.

**DOGS:** No person shall own, harbor or keep any dog which, by loud or frequent or habitual barking, yelping or howling, shall cause annoyance to the people in the neighborhood.

TO REPORT BARKING DOGS CALL: (231) 843-8644 OR CENTRAL DISPATCH: 911

**SNOW REMOVAL:** Removal of snow from sidewalks and drives is responsibility of the property owner/occupant. Snow cannot be shoveled or moved to the street or to other's private property.

**SIDEWALKS:** By ordinance, sidewalk maintenance and repair is the responsibility of the property owner. To assist owners in replacing sidewalk, the City of Ludington offers a 50% cost-sharing program. For questions or to sign-up for the program, contact the Department of Public Works at (231) 843-2873. **REPAIR PRIOR TO SALE:** No person shall sell any property in the City of Ludington that has any damaged or dangerous sidewalks without repairing or replacing such sidewalk prior to sale. All repairs or replacements shall be in accordance with city specifications.

**ALLEY PAVING:** Alley paving is done by a special assessment to the property owners. For more information please contact the City Clerk at (231) 845-6237.

**CHRISTMAS TREES:** The City of Ludington will pick up your Christmas tree at curb side through the end of January. After that time, Republic Service will pick up your Christmas tree with your regular garbage.

**CURB CUTS:** No opening in or through any curb or any street shall be made without first obtaining a written permit from the Department of Public Works. Curb cuts and sidewalk driveway crossings to provide access to private property shall comply City specifications. Permits can be obtained from City Hall or call (231) 843-2873 for information.

**BASIC RESIDENTIAL COLLECTION SERVICE:** Basic service will consist of one collection each week of up to ninety-nine gallons of household refuse. Containers of any size can be used, however all refuse must be bagged using three 33-gallon bags, or eight 13-gallon bags. Additional bags will require an additional refuse sticker at \$2.00 each.

**YARD WASTE:** Yard waste is picked up on Mondays only beginning the 1st Monday in April continuing through the last Monday in November. Yard waste carts (\$65) and bags (\$2) can be purchased at City Hall.



Mixed refuse from single-family homes placed in bags at curb side and all bulky items and all household appliances (non-Freon) will be picked up at no charge. There is no limit on the number of bags placed at the curb side for collection (no yard waste or hazardous waste). Residents wishing to dispose of tires and appliances with Freon must obtain the proper sticker from City Hall.



# SPRING/SUMMER PREPAREDNESS GUIDE 2017

## City Right-Of-Way

This means all of the land lying between property lines on either side of all streets, alleys and boulevards in the city, and includes lawn extensions and sidewalks and the area reserved therefore where such are not yet constructed. In short, it is often the area between the sidewalk and curb, including the sidewalk.

It is the property owner's responsibility to maintain the area from the sidewalk to the street, and to provide safe passage for pedestrians. Item(s) placed in the right-of-way without the appropriate removal sticker will be removed by the city and the property owner will be responsible to pay pick-up charges. A lien will be placed against the property if the pick-up charges are not paid.

## Environment Nuisances / Duty of owner or occupant

All persons who own or manage, lease, rent or occupy any premises or vacant land within the city whatsoever shall be equally responsible for keeping the premises from having growths of weeds or grasses in excess of ten inches on any property in the city and to prevent bushes, trees or shrubs from extending over the sidewalk, street or alley.

## Yard Waste

The yard waste program starts the first Monday in April and continues through the last Monday in November. The container can be purchased at City Hall, and the service is then renewed each season with the purchase of the yard waste sticker.

Approved bio yard waste bags are also available for purchase at City Hall and can be placed at the curb on Mondays for pick up. (Paper bags, plastic bags will not be allowed for yard waste)

## Leaf Corral

The leaf corral will be available for drop off of leaves only in the spring and in the fall. Please call Dept. of Public Works for dates and times. (231) 843-2873.

## Sidewalk

The City provides a 50/50 sidewalk replacement program where the homeowner is responsible for 50% of the total cost of replacement and the City will pay the other 50%. If your sidewalk needs to be replaced, please call the Department of Public Works at 231-843-2873.

## Garbage Placement for Collection

No garbage, refuse or recyclables or other items shall be placed for collection earlier than 5:00 p.m. on the day prior to the scheduled collection for such premises. Items which have not been removed by the city's garbage collection service, including refuse and recycling containers, shall not be allowed to remain at any curbside or along any alley or street past 7:00 p.m. on the day of such scheduled collection for such premises. Items left in the right-of-way will be subject to pick up fees and placed as a lien against the property.

Each household is allowed three 33-gallon bags or containers each week. Anything over this limit will require stickers, which can be purchased at City Hall.

## Spring Clean Up

The City provides a cleanup for residents to place household items at the curb for pickup. There is not a charge for unlimited bags, boxes, bundles, bulky items, and non-freon appliances. Freon appliances will need a sticker at a discounted price and tires can be placed at the curb, but must be cut in half and each tire will need a bulky items sticker.

This service is provided on the last Saturday in April for residents living from Ludington Ave. north, the first Saturday in May for residents living from Ludington Ave. south and the second Saturday in May for Crosswinds and Washington Woods.



# WINTER PREPAREDNESS GUIDE 2017

Winter in West Michigan can be a spectacular time of year with blankets of fresh snow and frosted-tipped foliage. As beautiful as the winter months can be, Mother Nature's cold snap does impact City operations and how residents interact with City services. This "Winter Preparedness Guide" contains information prepared by Ludington's City departments with tips and rules on how to survive and thrive during the winter months.

## SHOVELING OUT REFUSE & RECYCLING CARTS

### Ways to improve chances of uninterrupted winter pick-ups.

1. Clear a path 3 feet wide from your garbage and recycling cart to street.
2. Make sure they can be moved freely.
3. Make sure your garbage and recycling cart are shoveled out the night before your collection day.

### Refuse & Recycling Winter Holiday Schedule

Refuse and recycling collection is delayed one day following: Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day and New Year's Day.

### Refuse/Recycling Winter Tips

- Please bag refuse. Unbagged refuse can freeze in the cart making it difficult to empty.
- A clear path between carts/bags and the street must be available on collection day.
- Keep lids closed. Melting snow & rain can easily fill a cart and make them overweight.

## SNOW PLOWING

### What to expect

- It will take a minimum of four passes to clear your street.
- When there is a light snowfall, a small crew is called in to clear and salt the major high-traffic streets, parking lots and downtown sidewalks.
- During a heavy snowfall, the full crew is called in to plow all major and local streets, alleys, parking lots and downtown sidewalks.
- The policy of the City of Ludington is to replace or repair any damaged boxes that are a direct result of contact with one of our vehicles. However, if the damage is the result of the weight or force of the snow itself, the City of Ludington assumes no responsibility.



## PARKING

**Adhering to winter rules helps keep city streets safe and passable.**

**OFF STREET PARKING LUDINGTON CITY CODE: Article V Sec. 58-171**

No vehicle shall be parked in the customarily traveled portion of any street within the city from 3 a.m. to 7 a.m. November through April.

### DOWNTOWN PARKING

There are designated overnight parking spaces provided in each downtown parking lot. Please use these areas to avoid a ticket.

**Overnight parking is allowed from 3:00 a.m. – 7:00 a.m. November 1st – April 30th each night in the following areas:**

1. In the three northernmost parking spaces of each row in the parking lot behind the Old Hamlin Restaurant.
2. In the two northernmost parking spaces of each row in the parking lot behind the Post Office.
3. In the easternmost parking spaces in the parking lot just east of the Fire Hall and in the parking spaces immediately adjacent and to the west of the former comfort station.
4. In the 8-hour parking spaces on the south border of the parking lot behind the Eagles.
5. In the parking spaces on the west border in the parking lot just south of Ludington Area Center for the Arts.
6. In the northernmost parking spaces in the parking lot behind Sportsman's.

## SHOVELING

Residents are prohibited from shoveling or snow blowing snow into the street. Throw the snow into your yard.



## REDUCING THE "SECOND SHOVEL"

The City of Ludington's primary objective understand that it can be frustrating when plows push snow into driveways, sidewalks, fire hydrants and mailboxes. Shoveling a "corner" of the right-of-way free of snow in the area several feet before the driveway will help keep snow from being pushed into the driveway in an icy, heavy pile. Clearing an area large enough to hold the snow coming off the plow may help reduce the "Second Shovel."

## KEEP YOUR PIPES FLOWING

### Extreme cold weather tips to avoid frozen pipes

#### Identify your water main shutoff valve

Know where your main water shut-off is inside your home. Typically, it is located near the meter where the water line enters the building. It is very important to know where this valve is located, because if a pipe bursts anywhere in the house, this valve can turn the water off. Be sure everyone in the family knows where it is and what it does. This will allow you and others to find the valve quickly in an emergency.



#### Protect your water meter

The water meter is installed by the City of Ludington Utility Maintenance Department, however; it is the property owner's responsibility to protect the meter from damage. The space where the meter is located must be heated to protect it from freezing. If the meter is frozen or damaged, you will be charged for replacement.

#### Take extra precautions during extreme cold temperatures

- Pipes located next to an outside wall are most susceptible to freezing temperatures, as are pipes located in a garage or other unheated building. Exposed pipes in these areas should be wrapped or insulated, or, alternatively, shut off and drained prior to winter.
- Open cupboard doors under sinks, and open pipe chases where possible, especially where plumbing is in an exterior wall, to let interior heat warm the pipes.
- Temporarily keep a steady, but slow drip of cold water at an inside faucet farthest from the meter to keep water moving and less likely to freeze.
- If you're away for more than a day, shutting off your water and leaving the thermostat at 55 degrees or higher can reduce the chance of broken pipes.

## IF YOUR PIPES FREEZE

- NEVER thaw a frozen pipe with a torch or open flame. A hair dryer or the exhaust from a vacuum cleaner is a safer alternative.
- Opening a furnace vent or an inside basement door may also assist in thawing a frozen pipe and getting heat into the basement.
- Do not use electrical appliances in areas of standing water. You could be electrocuted.
- It may be best to contact a licensed plumber to avoid damage when pipes thaw.
- If the lines are frozen, assume they may be broken or split. Purchase repair clamps at a plumbing store or contact a plumber, and be prepared to turn water off when the pipes thaw.
- If there is no water to your home, the problem may be in the street if the water has been shut off to repair a broken watermain.

If your water service line is frozen and you are in need of water, it can be picked up at the Department of Public Works, 975 First Street, Monday – Friday 8:00 a.m. – 12:00 p.m. You will need to bring your own containers.
